



1-125 Lineage



Organized 15 April 1887 in the Reserve National Guard as the 3rd Infantry Regiment

Recognized in 1889 as a unit of the National Guard of Minnesota

Redesignated 4 May 1898 as the 14th Regiment, Minnesota Volunteer Infantry

Mustered into Federal Service 8 May 1898 at St. Paul; mustered out 18 November 1898

Reorganized 1900 as the 3rd Infantry in the Minnesota National Guard

Mustered into Federal service 30 June 1916 at Fort Snelling, Minnesota; mustered out 19 December 1916 at Fort Snelling

Called into Federal service 24 July 1917

Converted and redesignated 1 October 1917 as 125th Field Artillery and assigned to the 34th Division

Demobilized 22 January 1919 at Camp Dodge, Iowa

Reorganized 14 January 1921 in the Minnesota National Guard as the 125th Field Artillery, and assigned to the 34th Division

Inducted into Federal service 10 February 1941 at Anoka

Regiment broken up 30 January 1942:

Headquarters disbanded

Headquarters Battery redesignated Headquarters and Service 132nd Company

1st Battalion redesignated 125th Field Artillery Battalion, an element of the 34th Infantry Division (formerly the 34th Division)

2nd Battalion redesignated 2nd Battalion 194th Field Artillery and relieved from assignment to the 34th Infantry Division; redesignated 8 February as 995th Field Artillery Battalion (separate lineage)

125th Field Artillery Battalion inactivated 3 November 1945 at Camp Patrick Henry, Virginia; relieved from assignment to the 34 Infantry Division
10 June 1946

(Headquarters, 125th Field Artillery reconstituted 5 August 1945)

Consolidated 20 February 1947 with Headquarters, 125th Field Artillery (reconstituted 5 August 1945 in the Minnesota National Guard), and consolidated unit organized and Federally recognized as the 125th Field Artillery Battalion, Headquartered at Anoka and assigned to the 47th Infantry Division

Ordered into active service 16 January 1951 at home stations

(125th Field Artillery Battalion [NGUS] organized and Federally recognized 16 January 1953 with Headquarters at Anoka)

Released 2 December 1954 from active military service and reverted to State control; Concurrently, Federal recognition withdrawn from the 125th Field artillery Battalion (NGUS)

Consolidated 22 February 1959 with the 257th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion (see Annex), and consolidated unit redesignated the 125th Artillery, a parent regiment under the Combat Arms regimental System, to consist of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, Howitzer Battalions, elements of the 47th Infantry Division

Reorganized 1 April 1963 to consist of the 2nd and 3rd Battalion, elements of the 47th Infantry Division

Reorganized 1 February 1968 to consist of the 1st Battalion and the 2nd Battalion, elements of the 47th Infantry Division

Redesignated 1 May 1972 as the 125th Field Artillery

Reorganized 1 April 1977 to consist of the 1st Battalion

Withdrawn 30 November 1988 from the Combat Arms Regimental System and reorganized under the United States Army Regimental system.

Reorganized 10 February 1991 and assigned to the 34th Infantry Division

Reorganized under the BCT concept, 15 July 2005, as an element of 1BCT of the 34th Infantry Division

ANNEX

Constituted 28 June 1946 as 257th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion and allotted to Minnesota National Guard

Organized and Federally recognized 22 October 1946 with Headquarters at Cloquet

Redesignated 16 July 1951 as 257th Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion

Redesignated 1 October 1953 as 257th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion (Gun, 90-mm)
